

## Welcome

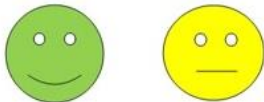
	<p>Welcome to the latest update from the Bradford Co-Production Partnership.</p> <p>Co-Production is about people who use services and people who run them working together to make them better. We are working with people who use adult social care services in the Bradford District.</p>
	<p>We want people to hear about the work we have done. We want to give people who use social care services a voice and a chance to get involved. We are working with people who manage care services locally.</p>
	<p>Our main story is about how people who have lived experience can get involved in the new neurodiversity and learning disability plans for the Bradford District.</p>
	<p>You can also find out about the work being done to develop an AI Assistant for people who want to find out about social care support.</p>

# Neurodivergence and learning disabilities involvement

	<p>Last year the Co-Production Partnership did some work with Bradford Council and the NHS looking at the new Neurodiversity and Learning Disabilities Plans for the Bradford District.</p>
	<p>The plans look at things like making sure people who have a learning disability or who are neurodivergent can get a good service and be part of their community.</p>
	<p>One of the things the Co-Production Partnership will be working on is to make sure the council and NHS involve people with lived experience as they work on the plans.</p>
	<p>In May, 17 people from 9 organisations met to see how we can make sure that people can be properly involved as the plans move forward.</p>
	<p>Some of the things people said were important for them to be involved included:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Our contribution needs to make a difference.</li><li>• It is helpful when meetings are a mix of in person and online (these are called hybrid meetings). It means more people can join in. Hybrid meetings need to be well run.</li></ul>



- Don't talk in jargon or use complicated words.
- Papers for meetings should be written in easy read.
- Help people build their confidence to be involved in meetings and projects.



We are wanting people to get involved in working with the council and NHS on these projects.

Commissioning – this means deciding which organisations run services locally.

How do we know services are working well for the people who use them?

Training staff to help them be better at working with people who have learning disabilities or who are neurodivergent.

Interviewing staff for jobs working with people with learning disabilities or who are neurodiverse. You might help write the questions or read the forms people send in to say why they will be good at the job.

Planning events around learning disabilities or neurodiversity.

Checking information around learning disabilities or neurodiversity, for example on NHS or council websites or leaflets.

Guides to public buildings – such as council or NHS buildings, or places like gyms or cinemas. These may be printed or made into a video.










Preparation for adulthood - making sure things go well when people move from children's to adult services.

## 'AI Annie' the AI Assistant for social care

	<p>Artificial Intelligence, usually called AI, is a new technology. It means computers will be able to answer people's questions more easily than they do now.</p>
	<p>Many people are already using AI tools such as Chat GTP and Open AI.</p>
	<p>At the beginning of May, a group of people who use different types of social care services met with the team from Bradford Council who are looking at how they can use AI to help people find the right support for them.</p>
	<p>We talked about what we knew about AI. We talked about how we felt about it.</p>
	<p>Karen Hudson from the council's Social Care Independent Advice Hub told us about how the council want to use AI. They want to make sure people can quickly and easily get information on different services they need.</p>
	<p>Some of the things which people said were important for them if they were to use an AI Assistant were:</p>
	<p>People liked that it would be available 24 hours a day, as many people can't phone up for advice during office hours.</p>
	<p>The information that it uses will have to be correct and up to date. When we looked at the test site there were quite a few things which were wrong. We were told that AI Annie won't be used until it is at least as good as a person at giving the right information.</p>
	<p>It needs to be secure and confidential. Karen said that nobody will be asked for any personal details (things like their name or address).</p>
